# THE ALBAN INStitute

WHERE DO CLERGY PEOPLE turn when in of resources that will help in one's ministry? More often than not I will turn to resources provided by **The Alban Institute**. The Institute was founded in 1974 by two ordained Anglican clergy, Loren Mead and Roy Oswald. In the Institute's words, "The Alban Institute is an independent center for learning and leadership development, with a focus on congregations." Loren Mead is well noted for his books *The Once and Future Church: Reinventing the Congregation for a New Mission Frontier* (this I have in the study) and *The Financial Meltdown of* 

the Main Line Churches. Both books have been well received and have been often loaned out.

Publications of the Institute is a quarterly magazine (available through being a member of the organization) and a weekly e-mail publication which is free to all those who sign up for it. Normally, it is available on Mondays. Recent topics have been: "Methods which Generate Change," "Then the Rules Changed," "A Church for our Grandchildren," Becoming an Affectively Competent Church," and many more. A recent Monday issue dealt with "Pastoral Transition in the Age of Social Media." I found this most interesting. All of these are available at no cost! When I was in judicatory work, I urged our ministers to avail themselves of these free publications.

The Institute does offer workshops, etc. I can remember attending one some time back. The theme was "The Small Church in a Changing World."

I have belonged to the Alban Institute since it was founded in 1974 and currently First Baptist Church has most graciously been willing to pay for my membership. All publications offered by the Alban Institute are available to me at a significant discount. One in particular is about evaluating clergy, asking the question "How can clergy be evaluated when the church is unwilling to provide the necessary resources to accomplish the goals?" The second book which I have is *When Better Isn't Enough – Evaluation Tools for the 21st Century Church* by Jill M. Hudson with a forward by Roy M. Oswald of the Alban Institute.

Such resources are a real aid to clergy of many denominations.



# Sharon Buttry Increases Her Global Ministry

A fter nearly nine years of ministering as a trusted and skilled volunteer alongside her husband, IM Global Consultant **Dan Buttry**, the Rev. **Sharon A. Buttry** and International Ministries (IM) have taken an important, additional step. Sharon has been endorsed to serve internationally with Dan as a Global Consultant for Community Transformation.

Sharon's dedication for this expanded ministry through IM has been evident in the Detroit, Michigan area, where she has served for 17 years. She observes: "I have seen the power of the gospel transform people physically, emotionally, socially and spiritually. Detroit has many social indicators that look more like the developing world than a typical U.S. city, so I have learned to cultivate hope in impossible and hostile situations. The work with IM is very similar as I team up with Dan in facilitating, teaching and encouraging indigenous leaders in their conflict situations. We take life-threatening conflict and trauma, hold it up to the light of the gospel, and expect Christ to bring transformation."

Wanting to continue her work in Michigan, Sharon's part-time status with IM will permit the Buttrys to annually conduct a two- to three-month ministry at the request of IM global partner organizations. The couple will be based at a university or Bible school within the partners' countries, teaching both in an academic setting and also at regional workshops as they prepare the next generation of biblical peacemakers. Such training, provided through the Kenya Peace, Reconciliation and Rehabilitation Initiative, contributed significantly to the outcome of peaceful elections in 2012.

Sharon, who is a licensed master's level social worker, will also provide spiritual support to those needing to recover from trauma. She says: "My childhood made me sensitive to trauma as I watched my family destroyed by anger, abuse and shame. God brought faithful people in my life who helped transform entrenched, negative patterns into the power to heal others. I celebrate the opportunity to teach the brokenhearted to refuse to accept a self-limiting victim mindset, and instead, become victorious in the love and power of Christ."





# Kissed by a Leaf

When I was a child, I lived in an abusive home. The resulting sadness and fear made me want to escape. I often rode my bike to get out of the house and explore nature. I just wanted to be alone, to find peace. When I was nine years old on one autumn day, I was sitting on a log in a peaceful woodland, and a leaf fell down and "kissed" me on the nose. I knew it was God. And a warmth and delight filled me. What joy to be noticed and loved by a kind heavenly Father!

Experiencing such love has empowered me for a variety of ministries. From 1996 to 2005, I was the director of Friendship House in Hamtramck, Michigan, a neighborhood center of the American Baptist Home Mission Societies. Today, three-quarters of my time is devoted to Acts 29 Fellowship, another Hamtramck endeavor, which continues the ministries seen in the 28 chapters of the book of Acts. And now my new, quarter-time role with IM will allow me to join more fully in the global ministry of my husband, Dan, in the area of community transformation.

Each of these opportunities for service has reinforced the truth I learned decades ago when I was kissed by a leaf, "Love is made perfect in us...." (1 John 4:17, GNB)

# 2014 Theme — Rise to the Challenge Biblical Reflection: Acts 16:9-10

'Come over to Macedonia and help us!"

It sounds so simple. And, in some ways, it was. God's ser-

vants heard the call and they acted. (Acts 16:10).

But Luke tells us much more! He shows us that when God's people *rise to the challenge* of mission, searching and struggle can be part of the process. That was just as true in the first century as it is in the twenty-first.

Even before Paul's second missionary journey began, there was trouble. Paul had a sharp disagreement with Barnabas about John Mark. So, Barnabas set out with John Mark, while Paul left separately with Silas.

Paul's goal was to strengthen the churches that had already been planted. Things went well at first. Timothy joined the mission team. Paul found the churches growing in depth and numbers.

But then things got difficult and puzzling. Luke does not tell us how God called Paul to move out beyond the established churches and enter new territory. But Luke does give us surprising news: Paul tried to head west, toward Ephesus, but he was "forbidden by the Holy Spirit to speak the word in Asia" (v. 6).

The surprises continued when the missionaries tried to head north, toward Bithnia. Again, Luke tells us that "the Spirit of Jesus did not allow them" (v. 7).

Prevented from pursuing mission opportunities to the left and to the right, Paul and his companions surely wondered what God was up to, as they continued on the road.

No wonder they were so ready to jump when the Macedonian vision came! (v. 9) After many false starts and over 400 miles of soul-searching uncertainty, when God finally opened a new door at the seaport of Troas, the missionaries were eager to respond!

This, too, is part of mission. God uses everything—including our struggles to see the way ahead—to shape us for more effective mission service. Clear visions in the night go hand-in-hand with uncertainty on the road. God uses it all to prepare us to *rise to the challenge* when new mission opportunities appear.


In 2014, American Baptists are entering our third century of participating in the international dimension of Christ's mission. The same God who called Paul to *come* to Christ, who enabled Paul to *grow* to maturity in Christ and who sent Paul to *change* the world in the power of the Spirit, is still sending us today.

The same God who invited Paul and his companions to *rise to the challenge* in Macedonia, invites us to do the same today. With confidence in God's call, in the power of the Spirit and in Jesus' promise to be with us always, let us together *Rise to the Challenge!*

# **Scavenger Hunt Fund Raiser**

## Who Will You Invite to the Scavenger Hunt?

This year we will be having a Scavenger Hunt rather than a Basket Auction for one of our fundraisers. It will be held on Saturday, April 5<sup>th</sup>, beginning at 12 p.m. It is sure to be a very fun social event, bringing in a substantial amount for our budget expenses, as well as a chance to invite our friends and family, and I encourage everyone to participate. For most of you, it will mean less of a financial investment than the Basket Auction required.

## This is how it will operate:

- Cost to participate: \$100 per team or \$25 per person
- Teams of 4 or 5 people will go out on a scavenger hunt, bringing back their treasures to the church at the end of the prescribed time.
- Items hunted may be informational and/or actual objects.
- When you register, you will receive your first item to find.
- It will be easy for any age level to participate.
- Those who do not wish to participate in the actual hunt, can pay the participation fee and come to the party for great refreshments and a chance at the prizes.
- There will be a wonderful prize for the first place team.
- Everyone who participates (auction or just attendance), will get tickets to put in baskets for the additional prizes. (No additional tickets will be sold it is not a basket auction.)
- There will be refreshments for everyone participating at the end of the hunt.

Team suggestions: **invite** your children and grandchildren to participate, encourage your neighbors and friends, your cousins, your nieces and nephews – especially those who normally participate in the annual auction. Think about how much you normally spend on the basket auctions (creating multiple baskets, buying tickets, making baked goods, buying dinner).
