As of January 2013, Williams has been part of Rockford Village Community Center's paid staff. Her reasons for choosing to work with NM include wanting to work with




children, considering NM a second home and—as an individual who was previously served by NM—being aware of its good work.


"My biggest joy is being able to make a child who's having a bad day smile," says Williams. "I love being able to help young people move forward in whatever they do."


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

FBC Indianapolis Reaches out to Neighboring Karen Refugees

The story below is about a ministry of the First Baptist Church of Indianapolis, Indiana, which is a recent recipient of the <u>Matthew 25 Grant</u>, sponsored by ABCUSA.

First Baptist Church of Indianapolis, Indiana, has a large number of Karen refugees from Myanmar who have moved into its neighborhood in recent years. As the church has reached out to help its new neighbors, they have noticed that the children of the families often begin school ill equipped to learn. They do not speak English, and they are not accustomed to the kind of social interactions that are normative in the American culture. Even children who have been in the U.S. for some time are insulated from the broader culture during their preschool years.

The church has created a scholarship program to allow these children to attend their preschool. The Karen children enter the classroom with welcoming smiles and excitement for the day's activities. Their social skills continue to grow throughout the school year. Learning to work and play with new friends is an invaluable lesson. Friendship truly is a universal language.

This year the ABCUSA Matthew 25 grant allowed First Baptist to fully fund the preschool costs for one Karen child, Sam. He made great progress over the course of the academic year, improving his English and learning quickly. He gets along well with his classmates and has learned the rules and routines of the classroom. He is learning to combine his Karen roots with his American surroundings. Because of this opportunity, Sam will enter kindergarten this fall with the readiness skills necessary for academic success.

Many studies have indicated the importance of early educational opportunities. Sam's future is brighter today because First Baptist Church of Indianapolis cared about him and helped him acquire the tools for success.

The Matthew 25 Grant, sponsored by ABCUSA, is funded by a generous donor whose goal is to help meet the needs of "housing, feeding, education and health with regard to the less fortunate." Ministries must be in relationship with American Baptist Churches to be eligible to apply. Awards for the Matthew 25 grant are made twice a year, in April and October, with application deadlines of March 1 and September 1.

10 Facts You Should Know About American Baptists

The 1.3-million members and over 5,200 congregations of American Baptist Churches USA share with more than 42 million Baptists around the world a common tradition begun in the early 17th century. That tradition has emphasized the Lordship and atoning sacrifice of Jesus Christ, believers' baptism, the competency of all believers to be in direct relationship with God and to interpret Scripture, the importance of the local church, the assurance of freedom in worship and opinion, and the need to be Christ's witnesses within society.

The following facts are representative of the tradition and practice of American Baptists. 1 American Baptists believe that Jesus Christ is Lord and Savior, and that the Bible is the divinely inspired word of God that serves as the final written authority for living out the Christian faith. American Baptists celebrate the fact that belief in Jesus Christ assures salvation and eternal

fellowship with a loving God. The events of the first Easter week are the cornerstones of our faith: the death of Christ, in which He took upon Himself the sin of the world, and the Resurrection, which gave proof of His triumph over sin and death. Holy Scripture always has been for American Baptists the authoritative and trustworthy guide

for knowing and serving the God who is revealed as Creator, Savior and Advocate.

2 For American Baptists the local church is the fundamental unit of mission in denominational life. Baptist roots date back four centuries to a people seeking the opportunity to worship God as individual members of freely organized and freely functioning local churches. Baptists always have maintained the need for autonomous congregations, responsible for articulating their own doctrine, style of worship and mission.

3 American Baptists partake of two ordinances: believers' baptism and The Lord's Supper. Baptism, an act of full immersion following Christ's example, is undertaken by those spiritually mature enough to understand its profound, symbolic significance: resurrection to new life in Christ. Through The Lord's Supper, or Holy Communion, the bread and cup that symbolize the broken body and shed blood offered by Christ recall God's great love for us—just as they did for the disciples on the eve of Christ's crucifixion.

4 American Baptists believe that the committed individual Christian can and should approach God directly, and that individual gifts of ministry should be shared. American Baptists hold that all who truly seek God are both competent and called to develop in that relationship. They have rejected creeds or other statements that might compromise each believer's obligation to interpret Scripture under the guidance of the Holy Spirit and within the community of faith. American Baptists also celebrate the special gifts of all believers, testifying that God can use each of us in ministry.

5 American Baptists take seriously the call to evangelism and missionary work. American Baptist worldwide mission work is a response to Christ's call to "make disciples of all nations." Through the efforts of our missionaries in partnership with others, ministries of evangelism, healing, education and development have made Christ's love known in the U.S. and around the world.

6 American Baptists support religious freedom and respect the expressions of faith of others. As a people whose forbears came together in response to intolerance, American Baptists have cherished freedom and pursued it for millions around the world. Manifestations of that ideal include supporting separation of church and state, advocating for people everywhere to be guaranteed the right to worship free from discrimination, and lifting up respectful dialog as a healthy means to understanding.

7 American Baptists acknowledge that God's family extends beyond our local churches, and that God calls us to cooperative ministries. Early Baptists saw that the effectiveness of their ministries would be greater through cooperation with other believers. Today within our American Baptist regions, churches work with each other and with denominational staff and in local and regional ecumenical arenas to increase the vitality and scope of their ministries. That outreach extends worldwide through our relationships with the Baptist World Alliance, the National Council of the Churches of Christ, the World Council of Churches and other groups.

8 American Baptists have been called to be Christ's witnesses for justice and wholeness within a broken society. American Baptists have been led by the Gospel mandates to promote holistic change within society, as witnessed by their advocacy of freed African Americans following the Civil War, the Civil Rights Movement, women in church and societal leadership, ecological responsibility, and many other issues. While not all of one mind as to how to deal with challenges, American Baptists do affirm the need to follow Christ's example by being actively involved in changing society.

9 American Baptist Churches USA celebrates the racial, cultural and theological diversity witnessed within its *membership.* American Baptist Churches USA today is the most racially inclusive Protestant body. Represented in our churches are equally diverse worship styles, cultural mores and approaches to Scriptural interpretation. The resulting challenges and opportunities have made us stronger — through fellowship, respect, mutual support and dialog, all based on a belief that unity in Christ involves growth and understanding.

10American Baptists heed the biblical call to renewal and the need for a vital witness in a new millennium. As people of faith, American Baptists seek renewal and revitalization. Informed by their history and tradition, motivated by contemporary needs and challenges, and strengthened by God's leading and the example and sacrifice of their Savior, American Baptists seek to bring a transforming witness to an uncharted future.

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

But 2013 wasn't just a year for extraordinary natural disasters, it was also a year of many man-made disasters, as the "Arab Spring" pro-democracy uprisings and intense internal civil conflicts continued and forced hundreds of thousands of Syrians to flee their homes. As the year came to an end, fighting in South Sudan uprooted hundreds of thousands who were already living precariously close to poverty. One Great Hour of Sharing World Relief Committee

ave you ever wondered how the gifts that you give to the One Great Hour of Sharing offering get to the places where they are put to work? This is the responsibility of the World Relief Committee (WRC or "Committee"). The Committee's purpose is to support, enable and encourage emergency relief, refugee work, disaster rehabilitation, and development assistance. The source of funds for this work is the gifts you give to the One Great Hour of Sharing offering.

The WRC is made up of people from different parts of our American Baptist life:

- 7 voting members elected as follows:
 - 2 from the Board of Directors of the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society;
 - 2 from the Board of Directors of the American Baptist Home Mission Societies;
 - 2 from the Board of General Ministries; and
 - 1 from the Executive Committee of the American Baptist Women's Ministries.
- 3 staff members: a representative each from the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society, the American Baptist Home Mission Societies, and the American Baptist Churches USA.
- The World Relief Officer serves as staff to the committee.

Although only the voting members vote on final decisions, all members have the opportunity to share their opinion on each of the project requests prior to the decision being made.

The World Relief Committee meets face-to-face two days a year to consider development project proposals. Each individual project proposal is submitted via a completed application which is presented by the appropriate staff representative and then considered by the committee. A formal vote is taken on each project, and the approval process is followed by a time of prayer for the partners who will receive the funding and for the people whose lives will be made better in some way by the project.

The committee also receives and reviews the annual financial report of the income and use of all One Great Hour of Sharing monies.

Looking Forward...

I received a copy of a survey from Pew Research Center, September 13, 2013, regarding church attendance - and why some people stay home. Worship attendance in the "seldom to never" category has increased from 25% to 29%, therefore, almost one out of three people you know or meet does not attend church, compared to a decade ago when it was one out of four.

The reasons given for this lack of action are:

- 24% cite personal priorities
- 16% are too busy
- Work conflicts
- Health problems
- Transportation Difficulties

Another 4 in 10 (37%) point to directly related issues with religion or church itself. The most common were disagreements with the beliefs of the religion or their church leaders or believe that attending worship is not important. Meanwhile, almost one-in-ten (9%) do not attribute their lack of attendance at services to anything in particular.

I've been studying three books which make suggestions for reaching those 1 in 3 persons who are non-religious, non-practicing and non-attending people. Our Worship and Music Committee is starting a study and making plans to look forward to rebuilding the congregation of our church. I've started study and hope to lead discussion on what we, at First Baptist can practically do, set priorities and make an action plan over the next several months.


Do we know the people who live around the church and around us? What are their priorities? Have we invited them to come to church? We have plenty of questions and are seeking answers. May the Holy Spirit lead us onward in this work.

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
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Bible Study
