ABHMS to host Space for Grace 2018 urban retreat



Register now for American Baptist Home Mission Societies' (ABHMS) highly anticipated "Thy Will Be Done"-themed Space for Grace 2018 conference planned for Nov. 14-16 in Philadelphia.

Join faith leaders, community service leaders, social justice advocates and others considering critical issues facing Christians today in the 2½ day-conference at Loews Hotel in the heart of a top-10 largest U.S. city. This urban retreat will allow participants to engage with passionate speakers, workshop leaders and fellow participants in conversation about mission engagement and discipleship development as well as church and community transformation.

The national event will feature these inspirational keynote speakers:

- the Rev. Dr. Amy Butler, senior minister,
 The Riverside Church, New York City;
- Dr. Molly T. Marshall, president and professor of Theology and Spiritual Formation, Central Baptist Theological Seminary, Shawnee, Kan.;

- the Rev. Dr. Corey D.B. Walker, vice president, dean and Professor of Religion and Society, Virginia Union University, Richmond; and
- the Rev. Dr. Raphael G. Warnock, senior pastor, the historic Ebenezer Baptist Church, Atlanta.

More than two dozen workshops offer take-home ideas and skills for enhancing personal ministry. Focusing on the themes of "Leadership," "Discipleship" and "Healing and Transforming Communities," workshops range from "America's Changing Religious Landscape and the Future of Faith" and "Worship with Impact Beyond Sunday" to "Healing from Unnamed Fear of the Other."

Early-bird registration through Aug. 15—which includes three evening receptions, two lunches and two breakfasts—is \$229. Full conference cost after Aug. 15 is \$299.

INTERNATIONAL MINISTRIES (IM) HAS RECEIVED AN EMERGENCY

RELIEF GRANT of \$8,500 from One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) to respond to the critical needs in Latin America following the deadly volcanic eruption in Guatemala and the violence in Nicaragua.

IM thanks God that the Rev. Ricardo Mayol Bracero, IM regional consultant for Iberoamerica and the Caribbean, who resides in Guatemala is safe. Drs. David and Laura Parajón, IM missionaries currently serving and residing in Nicaragua, have not been directly impacted. However, a report from the Parajóns said that their staff at AMOS is dealing with inner conflicts related to the political crisis.

Volcanic eruption in Guatemala

On June 2, Guatemala's 3,763-meter-tall Volcán de Fuego erupted, blackening the local landscape and sending clouds of hot gas and ash drifting across the country for miles. Multiple smaller eruptions have followed, much less devastating than the first, but nonetheless hampering relief efforts in the areas closest to the volcano.

According to Mayol, "Volcán de Fuego began to expel ashes (grit or burning fine dust) continuously. Later that day, it furiously thundered and expelled volcanic gases and burning rocks and burning ashes." This powerful eruption "filled Guatemala with mourning . . . with 33 dead, 1,701,956 people affected, 46 injured, people and villages buried."

In the face of this tragedy, the Ecumenical Christian Council of Guatemala and other partners have assessed the situation and have proposed an intervention. "The initial challenge is to give direct assistance to the victims," Mayol said, "However, we envision a next stage of solidarity providing means to guarantee the food security of our suffering brothers."

Political unrest in Nicaragua

"After two months of chaos and political unrest in Nicaragua, at least 97 protesters have been killed by forces loyal to the government. According to reliable sources, 868 additional people have been wounded and 438 others detained," said the Rev. Dr. Lee Spitzer, general secretary of the American Baptist Churches USA. In consultation with the Rev. Sharon Koh, CEO / executive director of IM, and IM global servants, Dr. Spitzer sent a letter to the consulate general of Nicaragua in Washington DC. The letter expresses American Baptists' deep concern over recent events in Nicaragua.


Mayol addressed this letter in a recent email: "Nicaragua is suffering vivid violence. . . . In such a confusing environment, it is urgent to be present as our sisters and brothers' keepers. Therefore, in your voice, there are our voices."

Of the initial \$8,500 OGHS emergency relief grant, \$2,000 has been provided to IM partner UPOLI (Polytechnic University of Nicaragua), \$4,000 to the Baptist Convention of Nicaragua and \$2,500 to the Ecumenical Christian Council of Guatemala.

Baptists throughout the world are showing their concern by their prayers and donations. "It is through IM's extensive network of ecumenical and national partners that we as American Baptists are able to provide relief in these areas. Your financial support is requested, as these recent events have brought devastation to thousands," said Lisa Rothenberger, American Baptist world relief officer.

Parking Lot And Challenge

As you have undoubtedly noticed over the past couple of years, our parking lot has been deteriorating. Work was done last fall but more paving as well as sealing and re-striping needs to be done.

We share the parking lot the Drs. Schwartz and Gedeon. Their practice pays two-thirds of any costs associated with the lot, including snowplowing, etc. We pay one-third. This arrangement has worked well for many years.

Our share of the work that needs to be done is \$2500.00. Projects such as refurbishment of the gym (almost done) and the vestibule (porch) (only finishing touches to be done) have been covered by memorial gifts. Unfortunately, the parking lot is not covered by memorial gifts and we need to raise our share through a small campaign, since this expenditure is not in the budget. The Trustees have authorized this effort.

The good news is that certain amounts have already been pledged\: personal gifts and income from the Rummage Sale. Of special note is a challenge on the table from more than one donor. Any gift of \$100.00 or more to the parking lot will be matched, thereby doubling the gift! With this challenge and pledges already in place, we'll get the parking lot covered (literally as well as figuratively) quickly.



Brighton Community Church had been using the same hymnal as we do (The Chalice Hymnal). Since the Burmese congregation does not use a hymnal (or the English language) in its services, we are the recipients of Brighton's hymnbooks. This is very helpful to us, since it almost doubles our number of hymnals and when we have services, such as the large turnout we had for the Memorial for Tom and Carolyn Culbreth, we do not have enough hymnals to go around. Also, as you have undoubtedly noticed, are the changes in the Chapel. Brighton Community Church has given us their organ! As the Burmese congregation does not use an organ in their services, Brighton has given us their organ as well. The spinet organ in our Chapel has not worked for years, and so a full-sized contemporary style console organ is a welcome addition and will be available for use in small services, small weddings, etc.

IM Announces New Director of Mission Mobilization



International Ministries (IM) is excited to announce the selection of the Rev. Dr. Rodney Ragwan as director of Mission Mobilization. Ragwan began his service in this key leadership position on June 1.

In this position, formerly titled director of Vocational Development, Ragwan is cultivating relationships with prospective global servants and counseling them in their discernment of God's call; managing IM's application and assessment process for mission candidates; and training and supervising pre-assignment global servants in network building, fundraising and preparation for long-term mission service. Ragwan will also host IM's annual Hear the Call conference, a weekend retreat for adults who are exploring a personal call to join God in global mission.

Ragwan follows the Rev. Jim Bell, who held this role since 2012. Bell continues with IM as associate executive director for Global Mission.

"I am delighted that Rodney has accepted God's call to lead IM's mission mobilization ministries," says Bell. "Rodney demonstrates a unique combination of theological and missiological expertise with a pastoral heart and relational warmth. I expect he will be greatly appreciated as a spiritual guide and coach for those who are discerning God's call to global mission work."

Ragwan is a native of Durban, South Africa, and earned a Licentiate in Theology from the Baptist Theological College of Southern Africa. He has also received a Doctorate of Ministry (D.Min.) from Palmer Theological Seminary and a Ph.D. from the University of Pretoria. He is now a member of Springfield Baptist Church in Springfield, Pennsylvania.

"I am excited to be part of this amazing mission sending organization," said Ragwan. "I appreciate the mission model that IM uses, in which Christian leaders are encouraged to carry out mission from a theological base that is informed, coherent and biblically grounded. As a person who was a recipient of the good news of the gospel, I am now participating in preparing global servants of different genders, ethnicities and racial backgrounds to participate in God's mission around the world."

Ragwan's own diverse professional background and education and his dedication to serving as a humble servant of God uniquely qualify him for this role. In his home country of South Africa, he served with the Baptist Association of South Africa, first as the Christian education director, then as mission director and finally as president. Ragwan has also served as a pastor in both South Africa and the U.S., and in recent years he has worked in administrative and faculty positions at Eastern University and Palmer Seminary. As the first director of Palmer's Open seminary program,

Ragwan and the ministries of IM crossed paths in surprising ways before he ever considered a call with the mission organization. Ragwan reflects, "While researching my dissertation, I uncovered a wealth of information on IM's relationship with the Baptist Association of South Africa, the organization I led from 2001 to 2003. This relationship started in the 1800s in India, a country of my ancestors that I have yet to visit. Through the ministry of the American Baptist missionaries in India, an indigenous missionary, the Rev. John Rangiah, and his family responded to a call to go to South Africa to work with the Telugu-speaking indentured laborers who had earlier arrived from India." In addition to his discovery of this historical connection, Ragwan also encountered IM in his own ministry. He explains, "While serving the Baptist Association of South Africa as President, I worked with IM's area director for Africa at that time, the Rev. Charles Jones, and led the association into a partnership with IM."

Ragwan and his wife, Eva Anita, live in Lansdowne, Pennsylvania, and have three adult children and two grandchildren. Please join IM in welcoming Ragwan to his new role! He can be reached by email at rragwan@internationalministries.org.
