

SO TEACH US TO NUMBER OUR DAYS, THAT WE MAY GAIN A HEART OF WISDOM. (PSALM 90:12)

Last month I used my space in *Tower Topics* to begin an in-depth study of Hebrew words which give us a more profound understanding of biblical wisdom. The light came on for one reader who realized for the first time how the translation of adam as "man" or "mankind" works. In the Bible it got spelled with a capital A in the poetic Genesis account of the beginning of Mankind, as if the author had called this representative of the species Mr. Man.

A common misunderstanding among those who read the Bible literally in English concerns their mistaken belief that in the story of creation, each day ("yom" in Hebrew) consisted of 24 hours. This gets them into all kinds of trouble in a fake conflict between religion and science, and their failure to recognize the movement of God's hand in evolution over time.

Yom does not just describe a day, but time in general. When the Bible speaks of what happened "in the day of David," it is not suggesting that David lived for only 24 hours. When we ourselves speak of "this day and age" we are not speaking of 24 hours. So we ourselves use the word yom or day in the same poetic and profound way as it is used in Genesis. To give a few more examples, "In my grandfather's day, cars did not go very fast" or "In the day of the dinosaurs there were not many mammals."

Those who are not yet convinced that Genesis, Chapter I is a beautiful poem with profound truth might check all the other places in the Bible where day or yom clearly means more than 24 hours. In our pew Bibles at First Baptist Church, "yom" is translated as "time" in Genesis 4:3 and in Isaiah 30:8, but also as "year" (I Kings 1:1, 2 Chronicles 21:19, Amos 4:4), or "age" (Gen 18:11, 24:1 and 47:28; Joshua 23:1 and 23:2) or "always" (Deuteronomy 5:29, 6:24 and 14:23, and in 2 Chronicles 18:7), or "season" (Genesis 40:4, Joshua 24:7, 2 Chronicles 15:3) and can be translated as epoch or era (Genesis 1:5,8,13,19,23,31), except that it then loses its poetic beauty.

Why does it matter that we understand the days of creation as epochs or eras, lasting a billion years or more each? Partly because people who are counting the hours of the "days" even before the creation of the sun give religion a bad name among others who think religious people are stupid. Then they won't listen to us when we have something important to say about how we should live ... how we should spend our "time" ... getting now to the real heart of religion.

But even more than that, a shallow understanding of only the surface meaning of scripture prevents Christian believers from appreciating the depth of meaning in the Bible, and the ways in which God works in our own lives today. God works in God's time, not in our petty measurements by the ticking of the clock or by the pages of the human calendar. God shapes our lives in a manner which allows us to participate in the creativity that leads to progress and fulfillment.

Each day counts, but only when seen in the larger context of the way in which God answers prayer and draws each willing person into his purpose. The time of your life is not limited to just the hour you first believed, but to the eternity in which the days of your life are played out in peace, security and purpose. In an alternate translation of the title above, we might ask God to

"Teach us to value our time, that we may gain a heart of wisdom."

ABWM of West Virginia aids Christian Center via White Cross

Clothing, school supplies, postage stamps, camping supplies, hygiene kits, office supplies, sheets, pillows and towels. These items are just a few of those that American Baptist Women's Ministries (ABWM) of West Virginia have been supplying over the years to Weirton (W.Va.) Christian Center through American Baptist Home Mission Societies' (ABHMS) White Cross ministry.

An American Baptist ministry since 1917, the center is a partner of ABHMS' Community Outreach Ministries. The center offers free preschool classes with a Bible-based, hands-on curriculum. The 3- to 5-year-olds learn scriptures and enjoy free lunch daily. The center not only offers a free safe-haven after-school program that serves at-risk students in kindergarten through middle school but also a leadership program for high school students.

Center partners provide free piano, guitar and ukulele lessons as well as special educational programs on healthy food choices, fitness, drug abuse, violence prevention, safety, self-reliance and responsibility. If that's not enough, the center also offers daily devotions, Bible study and scripture memory contests to encourage relationships with the Lord.

On a daily basis, the staff provides homework help, tutoring and computer access to Lexia Core Reading and iXL for science, math and social studies. The Quarters for Grades program provides incentive for good grades and attendance. Students receive dinner and a snack daily as well as "Blessing Bags" of food to take home over long school and center breaks. During the summer, offerings are a reading-focused program and church camp.

Kim Weaver, the center's executive director, notes that donations have come from ABWM groups across the state. Many groups recently donated books for the center's library.

"Each year," she says, "we have a group of ladies who make quilts for our children and others who make and send hats, scarves and gloves."


The value of White Cross items received in 2019 was \$14,636, according to Weaver.

"Since we have no billable services, and our grants are all very specific to particular programming or requests, we have to focus on taking care of payroll and operational expenses," she says. "If it were not for all the supplies and gift cards that the ladies provide us with, it would be a huge expense for us. Our ministry would not be the same without being able to provide our children and families with their donations."

Weaver has nothing but high praise for the women who contribute via White Cross.

"I have never seen a more powerful group of ladies," she stresses. "They have a mission, and it's always accomplished. I have seen small groups of older women do some powerful things. Their hearts for the Lord—along with wisdom and experience—are invaluable."

ABHMS has phased out its White Cross ministry, but continues to serve the underserved in neighborhood Christian centers, children's homes and mission schools around the United States and Puerto Rico through the new "Operation Planting Hope."



I know that it was probably very different then years past, but taking time to be thankful is very important and should certainly happen every day. 1 Thessalonians 5:18 – *Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.*

No matter how we celebrate Christmas, I hope everyone finds time to be in God's presence and celebrates the real reason for the Christmas season. Take time every day to read the Advent devotional and "prepare" yourself for Jesus' arrival. Refresh your relationship with God, appreciating the blessings you have received and continue to receive. Each week is labeled with the date and is followed by the sermon title or scripture reference. If you don't have your own Facebook page, you should still be able to find us by going to Facebook.com and then searching for the church page.

On any given Sunday, we have had 5, 6, 10, 15 people watching live and another 50 to 250 watching later in the day or during the week. We encourage everyone to "share" the church service on their page so that friends and family can join us in worship and also see what's going on at First Baptist!
