



Creation Ex Nihilo

Some of us have been enjoying discussions of theological concepts, but the real purpose of the study of theology is to show how what we believe can be applied to how we live. I promised our editor I would try to do something this month with the doctrine of *Creation Ex Nihilo*. This is the teaching that by God's action (energy), the universe came about miraculously through "Creation from Nothing."

Every now and again we meet someone who has trouble believing because they think the religion conflicts with science. The opposite is the case when we understand each correctly. St. Augustine established that from the religious side when in the year 450 he wrote about *Creation Ex Nihilo* in his book *De civitate Dei (The City of God)*. He was confirmed in 1905 from the scientific side in in the journal *Annalen der Physik* where Albert Einstein wrote an article called *Does the Inertia of a Body Depend Upon Its Energy Content?* In it he published what became the most famous equation in the world, E=mc² or "Energy equals mass times the speed of light squared." On the most basic level, the equation says that energy and mass (matter) are interchangeable; they are different forms of the same thing.

Scientists are all practically united in the belief that the universe began with a "Big Bang" about 14 billion years ago, and spread out over various epochs, which the Bible poetically calls "days" (or "yoms," meaning "times" in Hebrew). The question is, "What existed before the Big Bang?" Scientists say, "Nothing, that we know of." Which brings us back to Augustine, "creation out of nothing" and to Einstein who posits that it was no "thing" but an explosion of energy which turned into matter (and can turn back in to energy when we split the atom). That is the best science can come up with, … that energy from somewhere turned into matter. That Source, whatever it was, is what we call God.

And why did God create? Science does not touch that one, but, again, from our experience, God creates simply because He loves what He wills to create. It is in God's nature, and we are made in God's image (imago dei) according to Genesis 1: 27. So now we get to the application of the doctrine in life. If we are made in God's image, that means among other things that we are made to be creative. We don't have to create "from nothing;" God has blessed us with raw materials of our own. But from making a bed to cooking a meal or building a house, everything we do is to be done well, attractively, healthily and usefully. Even in palliative care at the end of life, one can offer a kindly word or a smile of blessing for the caregiver. When that cannot happen, life is over, even when we are walking around seemingly well.

If God creates to have something to love, someone to please, then those who are like God should please God in their actions. There is danger in imagining that if you work yourself to death you will both please God and prosper. This "protestant work ethic" is for another month, but keep purposefully active.

Our school memories are filled with happiness, and laughter, and fear over tests.

Proverbs 1:1-5 says, For learning about wisdom and instruction, for understanding words of insight, for gaining instruction in wise dealing, righteousness, justice, and equity; to teach shrewdness to the simple, knowledge and prudence to the young – let the wise also hear and gain in learning, and the discerning acquire skill ...

And so we keep learning. When we're done with pre-school, we don't look to our parents and say, "Well, that's that." Same goes with kindergarten, middle school and high school. Some of us continued to college or went on to learn a trade. But did we stop learning? No, we keep learning our whole lives through.

As you probably know, I love to study the Bible. Not just read it, but take it apart to see what the scripture says to me, says to the Church, says to our world. I want to know what God intends us to learn from His Word. I want to become the best me that I can be and I want to make a difference in this world, with the Holy Spirit's guidance. Philippians 4:9 – *Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in men, and the God of peace will be with you.*

Proverbs 9:9 - Give instruction to the wise, and they will become wiser still; teach the righteous and they will gain in learning. We are all to continue in our studies! No matter our age, no matter what's going on in our lives, we are to continue to learn.

Proverbs 22:6 – Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it. We are to take what we learn and share it with our children. A friend who has since passed, used to worry about her children, but she would always quote this passage, knowing that what they had been taught about Jesus Christ by both her and the church would stay with them. It was something that she continued to embrace, praying for her children daily.

Psalm 32:8 – *I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go; I will counsel you with my eye upon you.* If every decision we make, every word that is uttered from our mouth, comes from what Scripture directs us to do and say, we will grow closer to God and become more like Jesus Christ every day.

Romans 15:4 - For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, so that by steadfastness and by the encouragement of the scriptures we have hope.

Open your Bible and go on an adventure. Become more than you ever dreamed possible. Make the most amazing life-long friend in Jesus Christ. Create your tomorrows by absorbing every word from Scripture. Be filled with happiness, laughter and joy as you realize that when Jesus Christ is your Savior, there is nothing to fear.

And pray for students and school staff as they begin another school year.










International Ministries endorses Rev. Toya Richards to serve as a global servant in South Africa

Rev. Toya Lynn Richards of Minneapolis, Minnesota, has been endorsed to serve as an International Ministries (IM) global servant in Cape Town, South Africa. She will serve as a teacher and professor at the Cape Town Baptist Seminary (CTBS), a ministry of IM partner the Baptist Union of Southern Africa.

Drawing upon her extensive career and experience in print journalism and communications, Rev. Richards will teach intermediate to advanced English language skills and research methodology, preparing students to meet the demands and requirements for seminary studies. Rev. Richards will also teach biblical peacemaking and be involved in community initiatives through the CTBS Center for Biblical Justice.

Rev. Richards earned a bachelor's degree in journalism from Western Kentucky University and an M.Div. from Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary. She is currently enrolled in a Doctor of Ministry program at McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago. She worked as a communications specialist with the Alliance of Baptists (Raleigh, North Carolina) and was director of communications for the Office of the General Assembly with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) in Louisville, Kentucky.

THE IMPACT OF YOUR GIVING

On the Road to Emmaus

Just like in the story in Luke 24, God meets us where we are, walks with us, and accompanies us on the journey. These times have been challenging, but God is at work and has given me many opportunities to accompany my Bolivian ministry partners in this time of illness with COVID-19 and walk with those who are grieving family members who have died due to the virus.

My Bolivian ministry partners, directors of House of Hope, Carmen and Richard (pictured above) contracted COVID-19 and pneumonia. They were severely ill and needed to be in the ICU. They were in need of oxygen, but with no oxygen and lack of ICU beds in Cochabamba due to hospitals being at capacity during this third wave of cases. All we could do was pray for a miracle and for oxygen. We mobilized our Bolivian medical doctors to search for oxygen concentrators. Thanks be to God we were able to find two concentrators for Carmen and Richard. The oxygen and prayers have helped them greatly! Also, we have been able to find the medicines they need to recover at home. They are still needing oxygen but they are getting better day by day. Their road to recovery is still long, but we know that God is with them every step of the way.
