



Medley Calls for Pastoral Compassion at Synod of Bishops

The story below was originally released by the <u>Baptist World Alliance</u> on October 28.

Roy Medley, ABCUSA General Secretary and fraternal delegate of the Baptist World Alliance (BWA) at the recent Synod of Bishops on the Family in Rome, urged the gathering "to emphasize the pastoral nature of the ministry which is entrusted to the whole church."

Medley, who is chair of the BWA Commission on Interfaith Relations and the Membership Committee, as well as a member of the BWA General Council and Executive Committee, emphasized that "there is no perfect family and no perfect marriage."

Rather, "in our broken world, families are not only a source of great blessing, they can also be a source of great harm as when a father molests his daughters, or brothers and sisters fight over inheritance. This is the pastoral reality: Families have their blessings and their dysfunctions."

Medley said the world longs for, but rarely expects, the presence of Christ. "Instead they see us abandoning them in the midst of their greatest personal struggles because of their irregular situations."

The BWA representative, who is also chair of the National Council of Churches USA, had joined other fraternal delegates to address the synod. These included representatives from the Orthodox, Methodist, Disciples of Christ and other Christian traditions.

The gathering, which convened from October 4-25, was in continuity with a similar synod in October 2014. It included Roman Catholic bishops from around the globe to discuss important issues facing families today.





SYMBOLISM

Symbols are all around us and help to guide us in our everyday living. This month we're going to look at some of the not so obvious symbols built into the structure of First Baptist Church.

Have you ever wondered why certain motives keep reoccurring throughout the church, especially in the sanctuary? The trefoil motif is a good example. In looking over the doors and other places, the trefoil (threefold) design signifies "Father, Son, and Holy Ghost," (the Trinity).




This is known in Christian architecture – and elsewhere – as the Trinitarian symbol.

Many times we pass right by items that fit perfectly into the architectural structure of the church that we don't even realize they are there.

One of the best examples is the woodwork below the balusters of the balcony. Arches in the wood are appliqued over the woodwork that is the same as the wainscoting. Care to guess the number of arches before you actually count them? Is this pure coincidence? Hardly!

In this day and age when a few cement blocks are piled up one on top of the other and a little paint is splashed on and it is called a "church," we should be extra thankful for the beauty and meaningfulness of our own building.

The Reverend Carmella Jones, a resident of Seabrook, Maryland, has been endorsed to serve as an American Baptist International Ministries (IM) missionary. She is planning to serve in Hungary as a school chaplain through IM partner Hungarian Baptist Aid.

Rev. Jones, a registered nurse and ordained ABCUSA pastor, is experienced in Faith Community Nursing, a specialty nursing practice that focuses on care of the spirit. The ministry promotes healing and health of mind, body and spirit through prevention and wellness education. It integrates faith and health, so care is provided in the context of the patient's values, beliefs and faith practices.

As an IM global worker, Jones' ministry will provide a listening presence and pastoral care to individual students, families and the school community. She brings to this position theological and nursing education that will uniquely equip her to teach and promote hope for the spirit and physical well-being.

"I am looking forward to working in the school environment," stated Jones. "Education is very important and I think when you minister to children you have an opportunity to change a person, a family and a community. I look forward to opportunities that will allow teaching that focuses on health and wellness in the context of faith and what it means to be a faithful steward of our faith." Jones is a member of University Baptist Church in College Park, Maryland. IM Area Director for Europe, the Middle East and Liberia, the Rev. Charles Jones writes, "I am so excited that we have endorsed Carmella for ministry with our partners in Hungary! She will have the opportunity to develop a pioneering ministry of outreach, counseling and health care in a context that both needs and welcomes the sharing of the Good News of salvation in Jesus Christ in creative, authentic and refreshing ways! We pray God's blessings in her life and ministry."

Rev. Jones earned her Masters of Divinity degree from Wesley Theological Seminary in 2012 and a Master of Art in Community Health Education and Wellness Promotion from Trinity Washington University in 1997. In 2015, Carmella was honored with the Crystal M. Lange College of Health and Human Services Distinguished Alumna award from Saginaw Valley State University from which she earned a B.S. in Nursing in 1981.

"I believe that when Christ is lifted up, people are drawn to God," commented Jones. "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house." (Matthew 5:14-15). "These verses are most meaningful to me as I enter mission service," she said.

Jones first heard about IM through her home church and her pastor, the Rev. John Burns. She attended the 2012 IM Call Retreat, an annual three-day event to introduce people interested in missionary service to IM. "Rev. Jones is wonderful minister who loves God and people," said Burns. "She engages everyone she meets with the joy, compassion and encouragement of Christ. I have seen her ministry skills grow through her time with our church and I am excited for Rev. Jones and the people she will minister to in Hungary because I know she will make a positive difference in their lives."

With New Leadership, ABHMS Presses On, Sharing God's Reconciling Love Across the Home Mission Field

LOS ANGELES, CA (ABNS 11/5/15)—"We are here today looking back at where we come from, realizing we are still on a journey because our work is not finished," said the Rev. Dr. Laura Sinclair when she opened the Nov. 3-4 board meeting of American Baptist Home Mission Societies (ABHMS) with worship.

Relating the ongoing work of ABHMS with the meeting's Philippians 3:14 theme — "I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus" (NIV) — Sinclair reminded the board of the need to continue pressing on. "That pressing on," she said, "needs to be continued relentlessly."

Executive Director Dr. Jeffrey Haggray, in his first report to the board, said he is "consumed by the moving forward, monitoring and measuring of mission." Thanking board members for their trust and support as he takes on the Home Mission Societies' mantle following the retirement of Dr. Aidsand F. Wright-Riggins III, he said, "I am humbled, grateful and encouraged by this opportunity to serve my American Baptist family as we continue responding to God's call to share the Good News of God's reconciling love and grace on the American mission field."

The board unanimously affirmed Lydia Flora Barlow for commissioning as an American Baptist home missionary. Via an Internet connection, Barlow, a member of Mt. Zion Baptist Church, Seattle, Wash., gave passionate testimony to her work addressing social and criminal justice issues through restoration of the lives of incarcerated individuals and their families

The Rev. Dr. Eddie Cruz, associate executive director of mission advancement, announced the 2016 America for Christ Offering theme—"Discipleship: Becoming More Like Christ," based on Ephesians 2:10.

In other business, board members shared in strategic conversations aimed at identifying specific discipleship-, community- and justice-related issues and opportunities that could strengthen mission focus and increase ministry impact.

Spiritual Renewal Is the New Ministry Focus for IM Missionaries Joyce and David Reed

News from International Ministries

Joyce and David Reed, American Baptist International Ministries (IM) missionaries, are striking out in a new direction as regional missionaries to Iberoamerica and the Caribbean. After 15 years serving in Baja California Sur, Mexico working with the local Mexican Baptist Convention to start new churches, build a theological school, develop its program and host mission teams, as of August 1, 2015, the Reeds embarked on a related but new ministry of spiritual renewal, spiritual formation and vocational calling.

In July 2016, the Reeds will return to Mexico to serve in their new role as regional IM missionaries working alongside local Baptist partners throughout Iberoamerica and the Caribbean . Their deepest desire is to draw pastors and lay people into a closer relationship

with God through spiritual disciplines such as stillness, listening, prayer, creative worship and spiritual companionship. "Dietrich Bonhoeffer says that people who are no longer listening to each other, will soon no longer be listening to God," shares Joyce. "Therefore, part of our new work will be cultivating an environment of intentional listening."

Joyce and David will offer retreats at which pastors and leaders can find rest, renewal and resources for self-care. They will develop curricula for spiritual formation courses to be taught in theological schools and will mentor young people who sense a call to ministry. This regional ministry is rooted in the concern that Christians around the world have become a very busy people who have lost sight of the movement of the Spirit. The Reeds are excited to discover how their new role can renew and encourage local congregations in the United States, as well as in Latin America. Last fall they were invited to offer a workshop on Spiritual Renewal as part of one church's Monthly Leadership Training initiative.

David was invited to lead a regional retreat for pastors on the theme of rest and renewal. Joyce led a Women's Retreat that focused on the theme of "Standing on the Threshold" and what it means to step into a deeper relationship with God. "People in our local churches are hungry for more of God," says David. "Our desire is not only to be available to our international partners, but also to our American Baptist churches."

In a surprising development, the Reeds were extended an invitation to teach Spiritual Formation as part of an on-line Master's level of study by Palmer Theological Seminary for students in Latin America. When a good Internet connection is not available, the Reeds will be available to travel to Cuba to facilitate Spiritual Discernment with IM's Cuban partners.
