





THE NEW YORK LANDMARKS CONSERVANCY



Sacred Sites Turns 30 - Let's All Celebrate

After 30 years and thousands of travel miles clocked, the Conservancy's <u>Sacred Sites program</u> has given **grants totaling \$9.3 million to 750 congregations** from East Hampton to Niagara Falls, funding 1,350 restoration projects. Our grants have had an outsized impact, helping historic religious properties complete restoration work totaling more than \$600 million, regardless of denomination.

We've connected hundreds of congregations to just the right architect, conservator, contractor, or stained glass studio for their particular project.

In 30 years, we've sponsored 40 workshops, providing training to over 3,000 clergy and congregation leaders in proactive maintenance and repair of roofs and facades, energy conservation, generating rental income via shared and partial adaptive use, fundraising for capital projects, and long-term financial management.


Maintaining and restoring these facilities has enabled them to continue to serve their communities with day care, senior programming, food pantries and cultural programming. Within the last year alone, our grantees provided services to over 164,000 individuals.

Our program publication, <u>Common Bond</u>, with special anniversary issues in 2011 and (forthcoming in) 2016, provides practical information on consultant and contractor selection, the proper care and maintenance of slate, shingle, and copper roofs, gutters, masonry and stained glass, fire prevention, energy conservation, and fundraising, with articles highlighting congregational success stories and best practices. <u>Our publications</u> "Managing Repair & Restoration Projects, A Congregation's How-To Guide," and "Inspecting and Maintaining Religious Properties," have guided hundreds of congregations through major repair projects.

We plan on celebrating throughout the year with a special anniversary issue of Common Bond, lectures, and special insider tours of sites participating in our annual **Sacred Sites Open House** this May 21st and 22nd. We hope you'll join us!

Different audiences. Surprisingly connected!

On January 16 I attended a barbeque hosted by the Islamic Center of Orlando, where I was privileged to present a statement of solidarity with the Muslim community on behalf of thousands of non-Muslim Americans. The previous day. I introduced a new map to Greater Good at their weekly breakfast. Greater Good is a group of Christian social activists, all men, from a range of business backgrounds and church affiliations.

From Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School:

Not a day goes by during the current presidential campaign without someone in the news media referring to the political influence of evangelical Christians. Over and over again the news media tells us what evangelical Christians want, for whom they will vote, and how much political influence they have.

The truth is that there is absolutely nothing in common between the meaning of the word evangelical and the 21st century political agenda of some right- wing political conservatives who just happen to be Christians. As a lifelong Christian, a 40 year pastor and clergyman, and now as president of a theological seminary I feel the need to rescue the word evangelical from the distortion of its present use. Evangelical Christians are not defined by the issues of the Tea Party, the Republican Party or the most conservative wings of any political party. The word evangelical carries absolutely no political connotation whatsoever. The word evangelical, rooted in the Greek word that means "good news" is a way to identify people who believe in a set of core beliefs including the authority of scripture, the divinity of Jesus, the fallen nature of humanity, the challenge to extend the message of Jesus to the whole world, what is known as the priesthood of all believers, and the belief that sinners can be saved. There is nothing in the meaning of the word evangelical about a reduced size of government, about repealing the Affordable Care Act, about limiting immigration of Muslims or relocating millions of illegal immigrants, about the Second Amendment and the right to bear arms even though that amendment was written in the time of single-shot flint rifles and is now being celebrated in an age of automatic weapons with ammunition magazines that hold 30-50 bullets. These issues that are at the center of the current political climate are a central part of a conservative political agenda that may appeal to some people who are Christian, but these issues have absolutely nothing to do with the word evangelical. According to the historical understanding of this word I would proudly identify myself as an evangelical. I believe in the good news; the redemptive life and message of Jesus. What I do not believe in is the way in which this word evangelical is employed within the current presidential campaign. The idea that Donald Trump and Ted Cruz have the support of "evangelical Christians" is a tragic and misleading notion. There are millions of true evangelicals based upon the actual meaning of this word that have absolutely no interest in the political agenda of either of those men. I am not writing in order to attack their ambitions to become president. I am writing to clarify the way in which the word evangelical is being misused and distorted in this and so many other election seasons. If ever there was an issue involving the separation of church and state this is it. The word evangelical belongs to the life of the global church and not to the political commentators on Fox News, CNN and MSNBC. Those Christians who buy into the political agenda of certain conservative candidates and office holders are free to do so, but the proper term for them is "conservatives" but not "evangelical Christians." The two issues have nothing in common and should not be used interchangeably.



New Country of Service for Ketly and Vital Pierre

The celebration of a new year for Ketly and Vital Pierre included giving thanks to God for a new ministry that began in the Caribbean during the last portion of 2015. Having served since 1999 as International Ministries (IM) missionaries on the Atlantic coast of Nicaragua, the Pierres are now applying their skills to strengthen local congregations and encourage existing churches to start new ones on the East Coast of the Dominican Republic (DR).

The couple's ministry will focus on leading and coordinating seminars and workshops to equip Nicaraguan church leaders to begin and strengthen a



broad range of outreach ministries in their communities. The Pierres will also serve as a link with volunteer groups, matching them with local ministries according to where they would be the most effective, as well as encouraging and facilitating Haitian mission work both within the DR and beyond.

Of their previous 16-year ministry in Nicaragua, which occurred in three different areas, Vital recently wrote: "Ketly and I worked ourselves out of job. We evangelized, made disciples and sent people out as witnesses for Christ. They are doing a tremendous job." He then specified how this ministry is being left in the capable hands of local church leaders whom he and Ketly trained: "Escarlet Fletes Córdoba is pastoring the congregation and directing the school in El Rama. Indira Fletes Sing is pastoring the church and directing the school in Kukra Hill. And Francisco Montiel is pastoring the church in Bluefields under the umbrella of a Council of Elders."

Anticipating how God can use them in the DR, Ketly comments: "Reconnecting with people with whom we worked from 1993 to 1997 in La Romana, DR, has been refreshing because God has prepared our lives for such a time of harvest. At the right time, we were invited to return to the DR in order to encourage, walk side-by-side and disciple those that God has called for His service. As Paul wrote in Ephesians 4:12-13, 'to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ.' Yes, it is our deepest desire for God to continue to use us as He did in Nicaragua, to do greater things in the DR and, through the Dominicans and Haitians who are here, in the world."

As the Pierres begin their new ministry, the Rev. <u>Adalia Gutierrez Lee</u>, area director of Iberoamerica and the Caribbean, says: "I have had the privilege to experience what true friendship and collaboration is about. Through daily discipleship, our Haitian-descent brothers and sisters like Ketly and Vital serve and empower their own people who work in the Dominican Republic's sugar cane bateys and team up with those visionaries from previous generations who first shared God's love and passion for mission among them."
