





Last month, a team of seven First Baptist members attended a conference by ABC New York State on "Change, Church & the Changing Church". Change involves a 3-fold process with endings, a muddled middle where things are uncertain, and a new beginning. Does a roller coaster ride come to mind? There are situations and emotions that arise from the transitions. We learned that there are opportunities ahead. If we embrace our distinctiveness, notice and accept that we are on a different path of ministry which we develop, new outcomes occur. We also learned that our core values don't change, they can be identified and a mission statement developed that outlines what we'd like. Notice the word "like". A bit of visioning or imagining is needed for the next step, then a plan describing the "how" comes next and resources are identified, organizational structure is reviewed and what gets daily attention moves to the forefront.

As we move into spring, a lot of discussion needs to happen. There was a millennium matrix, a chart describing characteristics of generational preferences given. What kind of service will meet the new digital generation's spiritual needs? There are new interesting characteristics in people due to technology that must be addressed. We also have a great divide when it comes to economic status, political goals, and educational background. Do we innovate or stay the same? Read the little book, "Who Moved My Cheese?" There's a lot to learn move ahead with the times.

Massachusetts Resident to Serve in Peace Ministry in Africa

Marilyn Raatz of North Chatham, Massachusetts, has been endorsed to serve as an American Baptist International Ministries (IM) regional missionary in Africa. She is planning to work with IM partners throughout Africa and will train, consult with and mentor young leaders in ministries of peace, justice and conflict transformation.

Raatz is not a newcomer to missionary service in Africa. "God first called me to Africa in 2007," she explains. "I have been returning ever since to teach from the Bible about issues of justice, such as equality for all people, human rights, and social and economic empowerment for those marginalized and oppressed."

"It is important to note that Africa is a continent with so much potential in terms of economy and spirituality, among other things," said Area Director for Africa the Reverend Eleazar Ziherambere. "We have seen that, unless we build the hearts of the people, the material and physical infrastructure can be

destroyed in a minute! Rwanda in 1994 is but one tragic example. I applaud the ministry of Mrs. Marilyn Raatz.

"For me," continues Ziherambere, "the bottom line for her work in Africa will be cultivating hearts of peace, justice, reconciliation and respect for others, and above all presenting Christ, the only real Prince of Peace, to our troubled brothers and sisters in Africa."

Raatz began her peace studies at the Boston University School of Theology and now holds a Master of Arts degree in Conflict Transformation from the Center for Justice and Peacebuilding at Eastern Mennonite University (EMU). She has also completed International Intensive Nonviolent Communication training at the Center for Nonviolent Communication in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and STAR (Strategies for Trauma Awareness and Resilience) training at EMU. She has trained with the Reverend Dr. Dan Buttry, IM's global consultant for peace and refuge, and with Training for Change, a Philadelphia-based organization devoted to justice causes. Raatz is also a court mediator on Cape Cod, where she presently resides.

Raatz's call to a ministry that promotes peace in troubled times is something that God has placed on her heart. "I have an exquisite vision of shalom," she says, "a divine peace that comes from spiritual introspection, recognizing our interdependence with all humans and all God has created, gently and humbly bearing one another's burdens and honoring every person's dignity.

"Sadly, my commitment to this work came out of personal experience with conflict and seeing how destructive it can be," she continues. "Visiting the Middle East was a true turning point for me: I returned home unable to forget what I had witnessed and knowing that I should not. I felt God say to me, 'I don't want your tears about what you have seen. I want your hands and feet. I want your voice.' I see that God uses everything to lovingly woo us to him and his appointed plan.

"My hope is to work in collaboration with students, teachers, young leaders and pastors to foster deep self-reflection and mutual understanding, and to share practical skills for transforming conflict into constructive, life-enhancing possibilities," Raatz concludes. "I want to encourage personal and communal commitment towards justice and compassion."

Raatz's home church, Brewster Baptist Church in Brewster, Massachusetts, heartily supports her endorsement as a regional missionary with IM. According to the Reverend Dr. Doug Scalise, the church's pastor, "We're very glad that International Ministries has enthusiastically endorsed Marilyn. She has been a very active member for many years, serving in many capacities. We're proud of how she has persevered with faith and courage in her life and ministry and we feel good about being a 'sending' congregation."

North Carolina Social Worker Endorsed to Serve Women in Ghana

Rovaughna E. Richardson of Charlotte, North Carolina, has been endorsed as an American Baptist International Ministries (IM) global worker. She is planning to serve in Ghana, Africa, at the Baptist Vocational Training Center (BVTC). She has been invited to serve through IM by IM partner the Ghana Baptist Convention.

As an IM global worker, Richardson will be working with girls and young women who have escaped or been rescued or released from the "trokosi" practice of ritual slavery. Usually between the ages of 8 and 12, each of these girls was chosen by her family to appease the gods for offenses committed by another family member. Each girl's local witch doctor would then have given her to a nearby shrine, where she was to serve the priests for the rest of her life, enduring forced labor, sexual and physical abuse and social isolation.

Trokosi was made illegal in Ghana in 1998, but government enforcement has been limited.

Richardson will be providing aftercare and rehabilitation to former trokosi slaves at BVTC in Frankadua, Ghana. She is looking forward to "globally promoting the importance of mental health in creating empowered and self-sustaining individuals and families." She adds, "It is my belief that physical treatments and interventions are more enduring if individuals are emotionally healthy and mentally supported."

According to the Reverend Grace Akunor, principal of BVTC, professional intervention is critical to convincing these women that they are human beings who are special and beloved children of the Most High, their Creator.

IM Area Director for Africa the Reverend Eleazar Ziherambere affirms Richardson's calling from God. "I praise God for Sister Richardson-for the skills she has received to be used to lift up those 'pressed ... , perplexed ... , pursued ... and smitten down.' I am convinced that the ministry of missionary Richardson will help those poor women, ex-wives of gods, to know that they are daughters of God Almighty."

Richardson is well prepared for her role in counseling and education in Ghana. She holds a Master of Education in Guidance and Counseling and a Master of Arts specializing in Human Development and Family Studies from Bowling Green State University in Bowling Green, Ohio. She also has an undergraduate degree in Social Work from the same University. Her experience in the field of behavioral health emphasizes work with young adults and families struggling with mental health issues and familial dysfunction, and she has also worked extensively in staff and community development.

Richardson's ministry in Ghana will build on her previous global volunteer experience with IM. "I was first drawn to this type of ministry more than 10 years ago when I volunteered to help with a vacation Bible school in Jamaica through my home church, Friendship Missionary Baptist in Charlotte, North Carolina," she says.

Richardson adds, "My fire for mission work was fueled again when I was invited to South Africa to use my social work and counseling skills with a challenged population of young adults battling substance and physical abuse, human trafficking, gang violence, issues of grief, depression and poor self-image. It was upon my return to Africa for the second time that I discovered this would be my life's mission."

"I have been praying for 25 years that we would have our own global missionary," the Reverend Dr. Clifford A. Jones, Sr. recently shared at Friendship Missionary Baptist Church. "We will celebrate our first full-time global missionary with Rovaughna Richardson."

Richardson first heard about IM through a deacon at her church who guided her to www.InternationalMinistries.org. She attended the 2013 IM Call Retreat, an annual three-day event to introduce people interested in missionary service to IM. "I knew I had to attend," says Richardson. Through the support of her congregation and Jones, her pastor, the retreat was made possible.

Karen Horsman of Plainfield, Indiana, and the Reverend Gregg Sneller of Portland, Oregon, have joined the home staff of American Baptist International Ministries (IM) as remotely-deployed development staff.

These additions to IM's staff will allow the global mission organization to connect its various ministry opportunities with churches and individuals who are passionate about sharing the gospel and meeting human needs. "As part of the Mission Advancement Team, Horsman and Sneller will assist in raising support for ministry operations, global staff, projects and other ministry priorities," stated Al Evon, associate executive director of Mission Advancement. Additionally, they will teach and implement principles and practices of biblical stewardship and generosity."

"IM is a great match for the things I am passionate about," comments Horsman. "It's all about fulfilling my call to a ministry of fundraising, stewardship and development, the great family of the ABCUSA and showing the love of Jesus Christ to all."

Horsman is a member of New Covenant Christian Life Center in Indianapolis, Indiana. In her most recent position, she served as Annual Fund Gift Officer at Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis. She previously served with Baptist Homes of Indiana and as a representative for the American Baptist Foundation.

Sneller has served as an ABCUSA pastor to four churches over the past 30 years. Most recently, he pastored Grant Park Baptist Church in Portland, Oregon. He is now attending this church as a member. "I love being part of the ABCUSA family," he says.

When asked why he feels called to this ministry at IM, Sneller responded, "As a lifelong American Baptist, for me IM is a vital part of my family and life story. From childhood on I have been linked to IM missionaries and have visited mission sites. I cannot imagine a greater opportunity for my life at this time than to ask people to partner and share in the work God is doing around the world through IM."

Both new staff members are looking forward to meeting and greeting pastors and donors and to learning how God is moving in local churches.
