



Mission IM Project - South Africa - Poultry and Protein



GOAL This project seeks to raise \$34,500 per year for the next three years to build on an already successful project implemented in 2012 to train and equip people in South Africa who are living in poverty to breed chickens for food and income.

SUMMARY In the region of KwaZulu Natal, South Africa, where rates of unemployment and HIV infection run high, Anita and Rick Gutierrez are opening up new self-employment opportunities for hundreds of people by equipping and training them to raise poultry.

DESCRIPTION Nutrition, food security, self-employment and health promotion are urgent needs in southern Africa today. KwaZulu Natal, South Africa, where Drs. Rick and Anita Gutierrez currently serve, has an HIV prevalence of 16.9%, including 12% of youths. Unemployment is about 65%. The spread of HIV and other infections is largely due to low employment prospects for young women, who often end up in sexual relationships with much older men as a survival strategy. This crisis of health and unemployment can be curtailed by sustainable self-employment, and Rick and Anita have found that raising poultry is a great place to start. This entry-level agricultural activity is within reach of most people in most places, from young people in rural tribal areas to older adults in dense cities; they need only an investment of supplies and training to get started. In 2012, the Gutierrezes launched a new program to help South Africans start their own small poultry farms. They developed a fully integrated system of poultry housing, feeding and watering technologies, incubation technologies and hygienic storage techniques. Their goal was to create a selfsustaining, reproducible agricultural system that, after a few months of stability, does not require further outside inputs. Success can mean an average income boost of \$200 per month. To date, this program has served around 150 people. Each participant receives a 200-foot-square, 16-foot-diameter geodesic dome, a basic housing unit for laying chickens, in addition to two incubators, two quail starter kits, mature layer hens and roosters, quail hens and cock birds, feed for two months, antibiotics and instructional materials. Participants are trained and supervised as they raise poultry, incubate and hatch eggs, brood and raise fowls and quails, grow Chaya plants to produce feed and develop local markets for their produce. This mission project seeks to advance the poultry program through these key goals: 1. Continued training in sustainable production of quality layer chickens, Goliath quail and eggs. 2. Further improvements to poultry system design, training and video resources for participants as well as the broader public. 3. Integration with the Gutierrezes' fruit tree grafting and perma-culture initiative as funding becomes available. 4. Quality of life improvements for 500 children, 500 youths and 100 adults living in poverty in the province of KwaZulu Natal, South Africa.




It's Candy Making Time!

A last will and testament is a person's last request. It has instructions to be followed, hopefully correctly.



IM Responds to Destruction Wrought by Tsunami in Indonesia



Following a deadly tsunami, International Ministries (IM) has provided \$15,000 in One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) emergency relief grants to partners in Indonesia. Funds will be sent to Transform Aid International, a Baptist partner relief organization with vast experience in disaster management.

Additional relief funds are desperately needed.

The Indonesian island of Sulawesi was devastated by a massive earthquake and tsunami on September 28, followed days later by a volcanic eruption. The death toll continues to mount. According to a <u>report</u> released on October 10 by the AHA Centre, 2,045 people are confirmed dead, 10,679 have been injured and 67,310 have been displaced from their homes.



IM Responds to Destruction Wrought by Tsunami in Indonesia

Endorsed IM Global Servants Aaron and Valerie Osterbrock, who are currently attending language school in Indonesia, remain unharmed.

"A great immediate concern is the risk of disease outbreak and deterioration of health conditions," reported Leslie Turley, area director for Southeast Asia and Japan. "International Ministries will be working with our partners in Indonesia, including the Union of Indonesia Baptist Churches and their relief arm, REBANA, as well as with the other organizations that will be coordinating with Baptist organizations. On-the-ground research and connection with local churches is being done by REBANA and representatives of the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship."

American Baptists are responding. Baptists throughout the world are showing their concern through prayers and donations.

"It is through IM's extensive network of ecumenical and national partners that we as American Baptists are able to provide relief in this area," said Lisa Rothenberger, American Baptist World Relief Officer. "Your financial support is requested, as these recent events have brought devastation to hundreds of thousands, and for many resurfaced vivid psychological trauma caused by previous natural disasters in this nation of over 17,000 islands."
